

One of the city's fastest-growing companies, health care consultancy firm Exusia, is run by a stripper-obsessed CEO who treats his jiggle-joint jaunts as business expenses, according to a new sexual harassment lawsuit brought by an employee.

Attorney Amy Green was hired to work with Exusia CEO Trevor Silver in October 2015. Green claims in her Manhattan Supreme Court suit that the married father of two young kids confided in her after a welcome dinner that strip clubs were his "outlet" and women were his "vice."

He clarified that going to strip clubs was his form of "relief" since, while there, he would turn off his cellphone and enjoy himself, the suit says.

His wife is the company's CFO and co-founder, Amy Silver.

Trevor Silver also bragged about "having unprotected anal sex with a black stripper in a hot tub" and boasted that he once woke up to a sexy sommelier from the Florentine restaurant at Chicago's JW Marriott giving him oral sex, according

to court papers.

Silver dipped into company coffers "to pay for such things as strip clubs and travel, entertainment and gifts for his girlfriends by characterizing them as business expenses," the suit says.

Beyond the braggadocio, Silver tried to get Green to sleep with him, rubbed her thigh and ogled her breasts, saying, "Wow, look at those," the suit alleges.

Green says she was sidelined at the company after complaining about the CEO's behavior.

"One time he was trying to convince me to go to a strip club and he said, 'Remember you can't sue me for sexual harassment,'" Green told The Post.

"Sadly, this is yet another recent example of the growing trend of men in positions of power engaging in highly offensive and inappropriate conduct in the workplace," said Green's attorney, Douglas Wigdor.

"Hopefully, this case will send a message that women must be treated with dignity and respect and not as objects subject to the whims and fantasies of powerful men," he added.

Silver's receptionist said he was in a meeting and unavailable to comment.

Exusia landed at No. 6 on Crain's 2016 list of the 50 fastest-growing businesses. The publication found that the midtown Manhattan company's revenue skyrocketed from \$167,552 in 2012 to \$14.9 million in 2015 — an astounding 8,801 percent growth rate.
